October is Vision Month. Your clubs should think about having a "White Cane Day" to collect for vision services. You may have to think outside the box and be creative. Some locations are still not allowing us to stand outside of their businesses to collect funds. So think about contacting a local business or restaurant and ask if you can set a decorated container to collect change for vision related activities. Be sure to include the Lions logo and other vision related pictures so the public knows what they are supporting. Another thing your club can do is to have your members trained on how to use the District's vision screeners. Once trained, you can contact your local elementary schools, daycares, Head Start Programs and local libraries to set up a time to conduct vision screenings. Remember, the earlier vision issues are detected, the better chance there is to correct them! Your club should be entering their PU101's to LCI. If you have not yet done so, and are unable to enter your club officers, please call or email District Administrator-Denise Poole @ 724-523-4212 or dypoole@comcast.net. It is very important for this information to be updated on the LCI website. This vital information will be sent to your club officers.

Another important item it to be sure to complete your monthly report to the District (MMA Reporting). The website address is lions14e.org. Once on the website, click on the "More" tab in the upper right-hand corner, and then click on "MMA Reporting" in the dropdown. The form is very easy to complete and does not take very long at all! Both the LCI Membership report and the MMA reports are due by the 27th of each month.

One of DG Margie's goals this year is to have every club reporting their club's service activities by using My Lion. If you do not know how to do so, please reach out to Denise Poole. Denise can enter or assist you in entering your club's service. You can also reach out to me for assistance. So, get on board and report your club's service.

Do not forget to RSVP to Mass Induction, which will be held on November 3rd. I hope to see you there!

This month on Oct 10th, we will acknowledge **World Mental Health Day**.

The meaning of "mental health" can mean different things to so many. To some this means anxiety to be around people, family and friends. Others it may mean a downward spiral of depression with suicidal thoughts. What we know is all mental health issues are important and need to be addressed.

With 1 out of 4 adults suffering from mental health issues we should feel free to talk about how we feel more openly and ask for help or where to get help. Yet most are still fearful of being judges or laughed at. When you see a person you know struggling, don't feel that you should shy away from them, ask them to talk. They may want your help to find the right person to talk too and to get the medical attention they need.

Lions are like-minded men and women in your town who are committed to helping the citizens of your town to live better lives, and to help make your town a better place for those who live and work here.

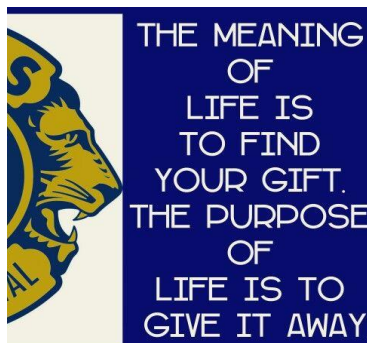

Dear Lions and Leos,

Can you believe that we have already completed the first quarter of this Lions year? What has your club accomplished? Have you completed a service project? If so, has it been reported? Do you know how to report? If not, PDG Tom Gregg did a recent Zoom Meeting that provided a LOT of great information. ZC Jeff taped the session and will place it on the district's website for you to view. Likewise, you can contact PDG Tom or one of the Cabinet members to walk you through the process, or send your information to Lion Denise Poole, our district administrator. Your service is important.

Has your club added any members? Recently, PDG Dave DeFazio, our District Global Leadership Team coordinator held a Zoom meeting for Club Presidents where I spoke about the Global Membership Approach that can be successful when you customize it to your club.



Where do you begin? At your next meeting, ask your members what they like about your club. Is it the socialization, speakers, service projects/fundraisers, the food, venue, etc.?

Then, ask what they would like to change. Would they prefer to meet on a different day, time, or have a different venue? Do they want to have more speakers or different topics? Would they prefer to just have dessert and a beverage? Would they like to do a service project at the meetings? Do they have suggestions for new projects or fundraisers? Are they interested in having an occasional theme/game night? Of course, remember those members who are absent; call to get their opinions.

Are there special needs within the community that are not being covered? Perhaps, there might be another non-profit organization with whom you can partner to provide this service or to increase your profits to use for other projects?

Are people moving into your community? Become friends with the local realtor to learn about new families. This is an opportunity to welcome new individuals or families into the community and to invite them to meet others, while providing service.

Is there a possibility of starting a club branch for those who may be passionate about a particular cause (homelessness, breast cancer, diabetes, pets, abused spouses/children, sports groups, frontline workers, illiteracy, etc.)? There are MANY possibilities. Remember, too, that we have a \$2 million insurance policy and grants that could be attractive to some of these groups.

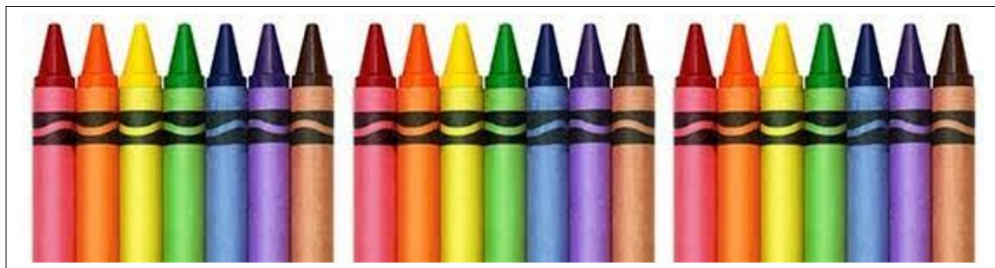
After considering these responses, develop a plan to attract members. If you're doing eye-screening, having a food collection, visiting a nursing home (if permitted), working at a festival/Parade, cleaning your community, etc., invite potential members to help so they can learn about your club and get hooked.

Finally, plan a Membership Social. This should REALLY be done twice a year. The Social doesn't need to be a meal. It can be dessert and a drink, or maybe just snacks. Showcase your service projects, NOT the fundraisers. That can be a turnoff. Instead, share information about the groups and people that you help. If possible, ask for one of your recipients to briefly discuss how your club has impacted them (Food Bank, scholarship winner, Student of the Month, a teacher whose class benefitted from the Dictionary Project, veterans' group, library, fire department, etc.) Remember, too, that there is NO charter fee through December 31; however, new member dues will be pro-rated.

Of course, Have Fun!!!

Leadership

Where is our next generation of Lions leaders? Are we giving them opportunities to develop their leadership skills? Are we encouraging them to step up and challenge themselves? Are we willing to take a step back from our own leadership roles and invest in our future leaders by acting as a mentor and coach instead?

It's no secret that we are not doing a great job of recruiting young Lions to our ranks. Furthermore, we are not doing a great job of engaging those young Lions that have joined us. As Lions members, we all need to be supportive of our new Lions and encourage them to seek leadership roles. By working in these roles, they gain skills to help their careers. In the end, they benefit personally and can help the club. If we do not present opportunities to our new Lions by being willing to step back, we are sealing our fate.

What if there are no new Lions to step up in our club? Another ongoing issue across our clubs is that we are not able to attract new Lion members. They say that if you keep doing the same thing, you always get the same results. Times change. If you are not attracting new members, what changes can you make that might spark interest in your club? Is it a new cause? A new project? Perhaps a new partnership with another organization like scouts, Rotary, Kiwanis, youth sports, church groups? Crossover between organizations allows each to benefit and some members will want to be a part of both organizations. See what the key interests in your community are and try to engage folks outside the club to help. They may join or bring others to you.

Challenge for this month. Begin building a succession plan for your club's top leadership. Do you know who will be president next year? Will it be the same person as this year? What about the year after that? If new leaders are not readily apparent, then your priority needs to be on recruiting new Lions.

Second challenge for all members is to expand your Lions experience outside of your own club. There are 34 clubs in Westmoreland County. Find an upcoming activity and volunteer to help a neighboring club out. See how different clubs function. If you enjoy the experience, perhaps you want to consider a role as a zone chairperson working with a small group of clubs in your area. We'll be scheduling a workshop in early 2022, just let me know I'll add you to the list.

As Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu once said, "A leader is best when people barely know he exists, when his work is done, his aim fulfilled, they will say: we did it ourselves." Let's begin mentoring and encouraging a new generation of leaders to replace us now while we can still train them and allow them to teach us new ways. Have a great month Lions!


Service

Service Reporting

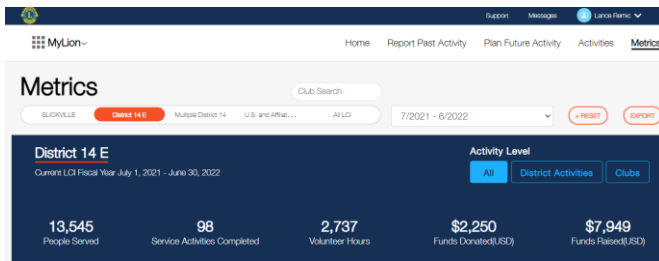
One of District Governor Margie's District Goals this year is to have 100% Service Reporting by the Clubs in the District. This goal is achievable but like any goal it has its challenges as well. We all have so much going on as Lions and in the rest of our lives that activities like reporting the Service that we have done goes undone.

At the Club level several people can help report Club Service Activities. These offices are the Club President, Secretary, Club Administrator, and the Club GST. Here is a quick how-to for Service reporting:

While on the lionsclubs.org website enter the Member Login area to Access your Lion Account. Here you can register for your account if this is your first time here but after you will use this as your portal to enter your email or phone number and the password that you created during registration.



Once you are logged in your Member Portal you can access several areas here depending on your role in your Lions Club. The MyLion area of this page allows you to enter the part of the website where Service activities can be entered and reported on. Not only can you report past activities but also plan for future projects and see the metrics of your Club for the year.




To report a past activity you can select "Report Past Activity." On the screen that appears you will see the reported activities. For those officers who can report for a Club, you will also find a "Report +" button. Clicking this will make the page shown here appear. This is where you enter the details of the activity.

Enter the details as accurately as you can using the drop-down menus, where available to help you. You will also be able to add a narrative about the project including some photos.

You can save the project as a draft to complete later or by clicking "Report" at the bottom of the page you can submit the project into the Service records of LCI. You should receive a screen message telling you that your project was successfully reported.

Remember that reportable activities include your hands-on Service projects, Club fundraisers, meetings, and any donations that your Club makes.



I myself need to step up with my Club's reporting and will make that my personal goal in the weeks ahead to help do my part in DG Margie's goal. I will work with any of you that need help with this process so feel free to reach out to me. Keep up the good work and remember "We Serve."

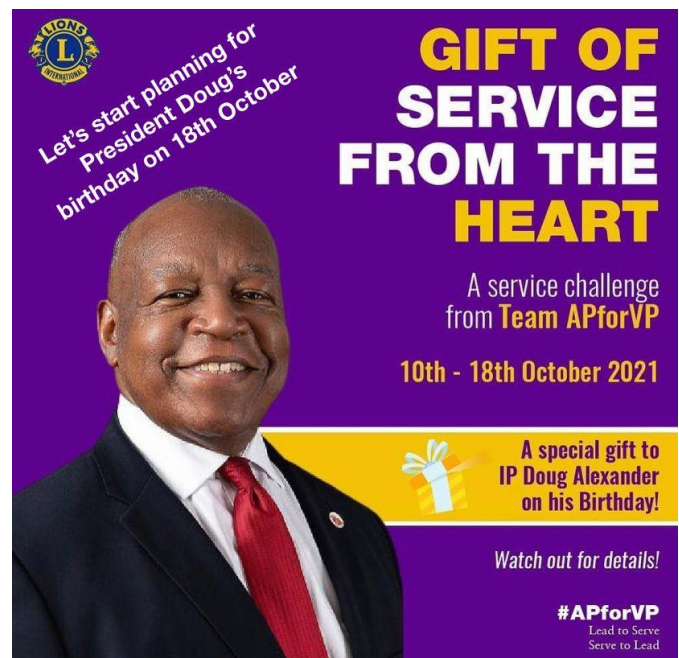
A SERVICE PROJECT CHALLENGE: October 10th – 18th

- The contest is open students who will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age.
- Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches. Do not mat or frame artwork.
- only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted. All media are accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.
- Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork any way.
- The use of lettering or numbering in front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster.
- Artwork should be done on a flexible material so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Voting for the peace poster will be held at the next cabinet meeting in November.

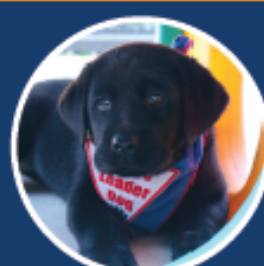

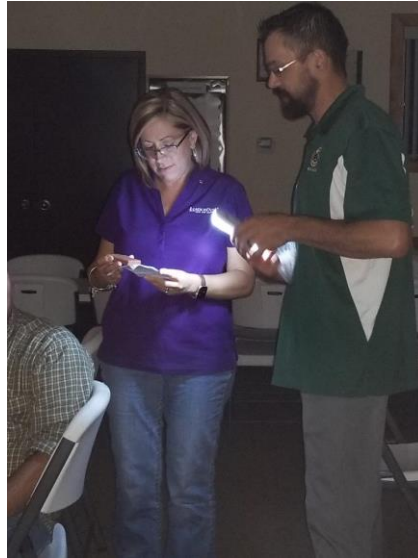
